Secret Letter #9 - 6th August 2020

Dear all!

Thank you all who sent kind comments on the newly released *Card College Playing Cards*. The 600 Collector Edition sets went in 78 minutes. I regret that many could not get what they wanted, but my publisher just tells me that he has one last Ace up his sleeve: they just launched a set in a beautiful acrylic box, and that's the last chance to get the Collector Edition Pop-up Card Boxes, <u>CLICK HERE</u> to go to the Kickstarter page. There you can also get the regular *Card College Playing Cards*, and I recommend you get a brick or two, as you will never again be able to buy them at that price. The cards and card case have some special features, and I will write more about it in the next letter.

On to this month's topic:

Ask Roberto: On Taking Notes & Store Them - Part 2

If you are new to this newsletter see *Secret Letter #6* for Part 1 of this series. The idea of these discourses is to share various ideas related to how you can study magic, especially how to take notes for optimal learning effect and how to avoid forgetting important things you've read or heard.

On making notes when reading

I'm often asked if one should write into books. I do, into most. All my books except old and valuable books are copiously annotated. I use pencil to write on the border, markers to highlight words and fine-liners to underline. I use markers of different colors, and I only highlight individual words, sometimes a few together, but not complete paragraphs. If I want to mark a paragraph, I put a stroke at its side.

Next to the title of an item I put a score, easiest seems from 1 (lousy) to 10 (superlative), or put "good, very good, excellent" etc. Any score system that means something to you will work. However, if the book is any good, revise every 5 or 10 years, as your criteria and

abilities will change. I have several tricks from the Ganson-Vernon books that 45 years ago got a "0" now have a "10"!

Also, I advise to qualify the type of item you mark. I use a very simple system:

A = anecdote

BB = bit of business

E = effect

G = gag, one-liner

H - historical info

P = presentation


PRI = principle

S = subtlety

T = technique

TH = theory

Thats' all, very simple, allowing me to immediately see what type of item it is that I marked when I look at the book years later. The photo below shows a double page from *Dai Vernon's More Inner Secrets of Card Magic*:




If you do not like to write into your books, you can use Post-its in various sizes and colors to stick into the pages next to the item you want to mark.

Finally, as an alternative or complement, you can extract the information into a notebook. In my case I have various notebooks for techniques, tricks, anecdotes etc. And for the techniques I have a notebook for major categories, e.g. the "Notebook of Controls" has over a dozen categories (Crimps, Peek, Pass, Key card, Break-Jog-Step, Mathematical, SideSteals etc.). For these notebooks I use binders, which allow individual pages to be inserted whenever more are needed. The photo below shows my "Controls Notebook". The annotation "EN" means the note has been transferred to Evernote (we'll talk about this next time).



I should also mention that for almost 40 years I wrote all tricks into nicely hand-bound notebooks which I would find in paper shops around the world. The photo below shows a very nice one I found at "Papyrus" (it still exists) in Florence, and I bought half a dozen. I wrote the notes with my favorite fountain pen, a Montblanc Solitaire in Sterling Silver with thread guilloche (I gave this to myself after having written volumes 1 and 2 of *Card College* in German, the original, in 1992 - I recommend making yourself gifts for special achievements:-)



OK, that's it for today as far as taking notes is concerned, folks. Next time I'll discuss the very important skill of making notes from videos, because they are not as easy as books to annotate (although this is possible).

What Did Not Go Into The Agendas

I received some nice feedback for this new heading in the *Secret Letter* which, as the title suggests, has items that did fit neither into *Secret Agenda*, nor *Hidden Agenda* nor *Secret Twitter*, for various reasons, but which I believe will be of interest to some of you. If I write enough *Secret Letters*, and you collect them, you'll have a fourth *Agenda* for free! I was inspired by reading a quote from Georg Christoph Lichtenberg (1742 - 1799), which translates approximately like this, "Of some important authors I would rather be interested to know what they discarded than what they chose." I apologize for the implicit immodesty, but here we go:

To Accompany With The Gaze

I consider this a very useful communication technique, which I've never heard about before. I discovered it several years ago when I checked out from a hotel. Upon completion of checkout, and just before leaving the reception desk, the employee with whom I had dealt, immediately looked at the next customer and took care of him. This made me feel uneasy, and I wondered why.

Then and there it occurred to me that the clerk could have made me feel much more *comfortable and important* by simply keeping eye contact with me *until I broke it*. Only then should he have looked at his next customer.

Similarly, when you arrive at the reception desk and there is someone before you, it is nice to be briefly met with the eye with a very short comment, «I'll be with you in just a moment.»


The same technique can be applied in our magic when sending a spectator who has assisted in a trick back to his seat. Even if he (or she) doesn't look at you, because he has his back turned, go along with/see him off by keep looking at him and saying a brief, "Thank you". Only then turn back to the audience, or to another member of the audience on stage or in the auditorium.


Personal Coaching Live or via Internet
